# Do Banking Crises Improve Democracy?

#### **BACKGROUND**

- Economic shocks have consequences on democracy
- •Banking crises (BC) have real consequences on the economy as witnessed by the recent financial crisis
- ... And on democracy?
  - Growing literature on political effects of banking crises.
  - But first attempt to study the impact of BC democracy
- Why? Based on Acemoglu and Robinson (2001)
- Non democratic countries are governed by a rich elite which coexists with a marginalized society (the poor)
- The poor can context the power by threatening a revolution, but at a given cost
- However, the cost decreases during BC, and this may force the elite to democratize to avoid a revolution

# **METHOD: Event Study**

- Before/After the end of a BC (the event)
- Sub-periods around the end of a BC




Fig 1. Event Study

RESULTS

- +++ (---): indicates positive (negative) and significant at 1%
- ++ (--): indicates positive (negative) and significant at 5%
- + (-): indicates positive (negative) and significant at 10%

#### **PURPOSE**

- Assess the impact of BC on democracy
  - Do BC affect democracy?
  - In the same way?
- Analyze the dynamics of the impact
  - What is the timing of the change?

### RESULTS

- Estimation by OLS controlling for country and year FE
- Robustness checks using an alternative measure of democracy, an IV approach, a System-GMM

## CONCLUSIONS

- Democracy improves in the 10 years that follow a BC
- The bulk of the change materializes from the 3<sup>rd</sup> year
- Severe BC have more consequences on democracy than moderate
   BC
- The results hold particularly for non democratic countries
